Beginning at the 2016 NWRM held in Walla Walla, WA a new Model A Evaluation was put in place for the Model A that is a driver. To avoid confusion with Fine Point Judging, cars are "Evaluated" not Judged, Scoring begins at "0" with points added for a maximum of 450 points. In fine point judging scoring begins at 500 and points are deducted for non-standard items. Below is the MAFCA Restorers Class Handout dated October 10, 2015 for the Connecting Rod.

The Restorers Class MAFCA RECOGNITION AWARD FOR THE EVERDAY MODEL A

Background: The intent of The Restorers Class shall be to recognize MAFCA members who utilize their Model A Ford vehicle as a "driver" through its primary use of being enjoyed on today's roads and highways. In consideration of today's modern roads with faster highway speeds, vehicles require improved performance, reliability and safety. This class allows owners to operate their vehicles with original, era and aftermarket parts. While original parts are considered the "benchmark", quality reproduction parts and accessories with the look of the original part are acceptable. Improved or modern parts such as an overdrive, air conditioner or alternator are permitted but are not evaluated. The recognition is to encourage members to maintain their vehicles to a standard that reflects the original design and look, while permitting the owner to operate their vehicle with reliability, safety and comfort

Policies & Procedures:

- 1. Vehicles are evaluated and awarded points based upon condition, finish and originality.
- 2. "Award Point System" each Model A starts at zero points and has the potential to earn up to a maximum of 450 points.
- 3. Good era and reproduction parts are accepted; as identified they will receive one less point.
- 4. Evaluators do not test any equipment as to its proper operation.
- 5. Visual evaluation only carried out, no tools or measuring devices utilized.
- 6. Vehicle evaluation encompasses Engine, Body, Exterior Plating, Interior, Wheels/Tires and Undercarriage areas.

Entry Criteria:

- 1. Vehicle owner shall be a current MAFCA member and is required to supply their membership number to enter a vehicle.
- 2. Model A as defined by Ford production (benchmark) No Modified or Speedster
- 3. Engine Block Model A or B.
- 4. Original or good reproduction parts as defined by Ford production for the year and model.
- 5. Paint: Model A era correct color for the year and model. Slight variations or interpretations are acceptable.
- 6. Vehicle must be licensed and road-worthy.
- 7. No fiberglass fenders or body parts.

Permissible Items: (No points awarded for these items)

- 1. Alternator
- 2. Radial Tires
- 3. Hydraulic Brakes

Accepted Items, not evaluated.

- 1. Turn Signals
- 2. Seat Belts
- 3. Additional Rear-View Mirror
- 4. Right Hand Tail Lamp and mounting Bracket.
- 5. Overdrive
- 6. 12 Volt System

- 7. Era Air Cleaner
- 8. Air Conditioner
- 9. Trailer Hitch
- 10. Accessories
- 11. Radios

The SOS kit is portable and taken to each club activity, while the CAMP tools are not. The idea was suggested by John Gugliotti who has been assigned by the club president, Dan Kasten, to be custodian of the equipment.



Members of the Treasure Valley Chapter established some records, of sorts, when they participated officially in drag races with their Model A Fords at the Thunder Ridge Raceway.

Participants were Hap and Dorothy Wilson, Royce and Vera Fifer, Bob and Johanna Beardsley, Dean and Roberta Windham, Wilbur and Gladys Shook, Doug and Virginia Hitt, Vern Long, and Chuck Ward. All cars present made the quarter mile run at least once.

Top time for the day was registered by Chuck Ward in his 1930 Roadster, with total elapsed time of 24.23 seconds, doing 51.13 miles per hour at the finish line. Close on his bumper was Royce Fifer in his 1930 Coupe, in 24.71 seconds at 51.03 miles per hour.

Grudge race of the day found the club president, Dr. Doug Hitt, underwhelming Hap Wilson by an embarrassing margin. Both have 1930 Briggs Town Sedans.

Top times for regular dragsters approached 170 miles per hour, prompting the announcer to invite spectators to take a refreshment break at the concession stands while the Model A's toured the 1,320-foot course — they should be back in time for the finish.
